The 2020 U.S. Women's Amateur Championship Committee spent a few days attending the 2019 Championship at Old Waverly in Mississippi. Championship Committee Co-Chair Ron Bubes says, "Even after going to the Golf Club of Tennessee last year, it was invaluable for our committee to go to Old Waverly."



Eight members of Woodmont's committee took full advantage of the opportunity to learn from the Old Waverly staff and host committee and the U.S. Golf Association (USGA) staff. "The host committee at Old Waverly could not have been more hospitable," Ron says. Woodmont will be hosting the 120th edition of the U.S. Women's Amateur Championship, a week-long tournament that requires extensive preparation and commitment.



What was it like for you to win the 2005 U.S. Women's Amateur Championship?

"It was really special for me to qualify and then go on to win. Still some of the best golf I've ever played in my career. The [amateur] is such a difficult tournament to win because of the match play aspect. It's the ultimate grinding test in amateur qualifier, the biggest prize. It's the most important trophy in amateur golf."

Speaking of, where did you put the Robert Cox Trophy for the year you had it? "I put it on the dining room table, as the centerpiece!"

What about Woodmont hosting the Championship pumps you up?

"It's the perfect venue. It's a fabulous golf course ... a lot of opportunities to make birdies, but also some opportunities to make big numbers, which in match play can definitely make things interesting."

What should Club Members know about this Championship that makes it unique?

"You're going to have the best women amateurs in the world converging upon Woodmont. The golf is going to be fantastic. More often than not, the champion turns professional and ends up on the LPGA. That's someone who the Club can cheer for forever as their amateur champion."

What are you most excited about for the players?

"It truly is a major. It's a major not just for amateur golf, but for a golf career as a whole. That's a lot of days to play competitive golf and to have to be on for every shot—it's really exhausting. The best athlete, in terms of endurance, is going to come out on top. And then, as with any Championship, you need a little bit of luck."
